### Featured New Collection Items, Lawrence MA, Flood of 1936

An early spring thaw and heavy rains following extremely heavy snowfall during the 1935-1936 winter filled Lake Winnepesaukee to dangerous levels and the spill-off began to flood the Merrimack, Spicket, and Shawsheen Rivers. A record 46.85 feet water level was recorded at the Lawrence Dam. Damages from the storm amounted to \$300M with 400,000 homeless and 178 deaths. See the complete collection [here](#).

## Digital Commonwealth goes to DPLA Fest 2019...

Members of the DPLA Community gathered at Chicago Public Library's Harold Washington Library Center for the fifth DPLA Fest and Network Day. Over three hundred delegates from public libraries, academic libraries, museums, and networks attended. DC's VP/President Elect and DPLA Network Rep, Alan Karass, was in attendance. The event began on April 16 with Network Day. Each DPLA Network sends representatives to participate in a forum that focuses on DPLA's current initiatives, strategic planning process, and future projects. This year's discussions centered on the organization's cultural heritage work, prospects for expanding the network, and the SimplyE e-book program. Additionally, staff members were actively engaged in conversations about improving communication with network members, financial sustainability, and staffing.

DPLA Fest continued April 17 and 18, featuring plenary sessions, lightning round talks, and breakout sessions. Michelle Kimpton, Director of Business Development for DPLA, announced DPLA's new partnership with the New York Public Library and Lyris to develop a national digital ebooks platform for libraries (see full announcement [here](#)). Chicago Mayor **Rahm Emanuel** made an exciting and unscheduled visit to talk about his library-related initiatives, and his belief in the transformative power of libraries! Sociologist Eric Klinenberg from New

York University discussed his ideas on the role of libraries in contemporary American society. Louise Bernard outlined the challenges of establishing the Obama Presidential Center and its digital collections.

Elaine Westbrook, University Librarian at UNC Chapel Hill, offering compelling commentary on the issue of diversity, equity, inclusion, and reconciliation in libraries and archives. The numerous breakout sessions cover a broad variety of topics including virtual reality in libraries, rights statements, copyright, digital storytelling, and community engagement.
